ENHANCED PRACTICE



Enhanced practice is a level of professional practice and describes experienced, knowledgeable health and care professionals who are able to manage a level of complexity of work and risk which is beyond entry to practice.

Practitioners at this level will:

- have undertaken post-registration education and training relevant to their area of practice or role
- be able to work as a team to manage discrete episodes of care

Enhanced practice in prosthetics and orthotics is not new

Practitioners at this level are likely to:

- act as clinical leads
- mentor junior colleagues
- manage more complex patients and patient groups







Enhanced Clinical Practitioner Apprenticeship

One pathway to enhanced practice

- 18 months at Master's level
- Mixture of taught content and work-based learning
- Suitable for P&Os who are newly promoted or working towards a job role that requires them to handle more complex patients (normally at Band 6)
