What is advanced practice?

Advanced practice is a level of professional practice which describes experienced, knowledgeable health and care professionals who are able to practise with a high degree of autonomy with responsibility for complex decision making.

Practitioners at this level will:

- have successfully completed a Master's degree in advanced practice that addresses all four pillars of practice ((clinical practice, leadership and management, education, and research)
- · manage and take responsibility for whole episodes of care





Benefits of advanced practice

Practitioners at this level:

- Handle complex patients from start to finish
- Have the ability and authority to make critical decisions in patient
- Order investigations and create comprehensive management plans
